SPEEDWAY AUTO HIT BY MAJOR FIRE (Information from Norfolk Daily News)

Damage estimates could be as high as \$1 million for Speedway Auto that caught on fire on October 23. Fire officials determined the fire started as a result of workers removing a gasoline tank which slipped and spilled on the floor, which was ignited by a nearby work light.

The Norfolk Fire Division was called to Speedway Auto, 807 East Norfolk Avenue at 10:28 on the 23rd and a building in the rear of the complex was fully involved with fire.

It took firefighters 45 minutes to gain control of the fire and it was extinguished in about three hours.

The building which had a

flat bed car hauler, several other vehicles and about 200 engines and other vehicle parts were all destroyed in the fire, according to fire officials.

There were four employees in the building at the time of the fire and all escaped uninjured. Terry Zwiebel, Norfolk's fire marshal estimated the damage could be as high as \$1 million.

Board Members and Officers will be announced at the GMARE Convention in South Sioux City in March, and Officers and Board Members will take office following the Convention.

SPECIAL SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE ALL BUT OVER

Due to a \$335 million revenue shortfall, Governor Dave Heineman called a special session of the Legislature which convened on November 4. The current two-year budget for the state of Nebraska is \$6.9 billion dollars. The cuts required (\$335 million) were about 4.8% of the total two-year budget.

The proposed budget by the Governor was sent to the Appropriations Committee, which was passed on second reading on November 18, and the end of the session is expected on Friday, November 20.

The Appropriations Committee made some changes to the Governor's proposal, specifically dealing with some cash funds which were being moved to general funds.

All in all, most agencies were cut about 2.5 percent for this year and about 5 percent for next year.

Transfers from the Motor Vehicle Industry Licensing Board cash fund which were cut included \$17,477 for this year and \$35,988 for 2011.

COMMITTEE HEARS TESTIMONY ON TOWING LAWS (FROM LEGISLATIVE REPORTING)

The Legislature's Transportation and Telecommunications Committee met in September and heard testimony on LR187, introduced by Omaha Sen. Steve Lathrop.

The resolution establishes an interim study to examine issues regarding the towing of motor vehicles. Lathrop introduced a bill last session that would have set the maximum fee for towing vehicles at \$100 and limited the fee to \$15 per day for storing a vehicle. The bill was indefinitely postponed in committee.

Lathrop said towing companies should not assess penalties for parking violations, as the Nebraska Constitution requires all penalty funds be directed to public schools. There is nothing in the existing law that stops somebody from towing your car, taking it three blocks down the street and then charging you \$185, he said. The committee will continue to study the issues over the interim.

Those of you in the towing business may want to be ready for legislation which may be introduced next year which may limit charges for towing and storage charges.

MAJOR ISSUES STAY ON FRONT BURNER WITH

CONGRESS

Health Care Reform, Climate Change/Cap & Trade Legislation, Card Check and possibly another economic stimulus package seem to top the news reports on the national level.

Businesses have concerns about health care reform and possible tax implications or requirements. The cost of energy and possible major increases in energy costs are concerns with the Cap & Trade Bill.

We're already seeing some major policy changes coming from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency with the new Administration.

The industry has just completed wading through the Cash for Clunkers program. It will be interesting to see what new stimulus programs are on the horizon.

MODEL LEGISLATION SUPPORTS USE OF

RECYCLED, NON-DEPLOYED EQUIPMENT AIRBAGS

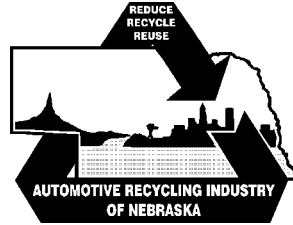
The National Conference of Insurance Legislators (NCOIL) is an organization of state legislators whose main area of public policy concern is product liability insurance legislation and regulation. Many members of NCOIL are the chairs or members of the committees responsible for insurance legislation in their respective state houses across the country.

The NCOIL Property-Casualty Insurance Committee has finalized development of a proposed model air bag fraud bill and will vote for its approval at their November Annual Meeting in New Orleans. The Committee has held conference calls over the past several months, of which the ARA was one of a few stakeholders invited to offer input.

Language submitted by ARA was successfully incorporated into the model act. The act establishes criminal penalties for fraudulent installation or reinstallation an air bag. Once passed by the NCOIL conference, the bill will serve as a model for any state to implement into law.

ARA is urging its members to make direct contact with their state legislators who are scheduled to attend the NCOIL annual meeting and has identified specific

actions that are designed to advocate the use of recycled air bags.
